

LOOKING FORWARD

Thanks in large part to Frederick County's diverse economy, the local business climate in 2010 continued to move forward despite economic instability at the national and state levels. The Frederick County Office of Economic Development (OED), continuing its mission to support existing businesses while attracting new companies, posted numerous successes during the year.



2010 marked the 10-year anniversary of our annual Business Appreciation Week, so we celebrated by visiting companies throughout the entire month of September! During the month, OED visited 201 companies to learn about their business and to say thanks for being a apart of Frederick County's business community. Ground was broken in the spring for Banner Life Insurance Company's new headquarters in Urbana, a \$33 million, 115,000 square foot facility that will employ 400 people. An OED partnership initiative, the Frederick Entrepreneur Support Network (ESN), held its first "Experts and Answers" speed business counseling event in 2010 providing concise, results oriented consultations to over 20 companies in less than four hours.

In 2010, OED also conducted its first comprehensive business survey of Frederick County companies, an initiative that will be conducted on an annual basis. With

over 200 companies responding, 78% of respondents said their number of employees has increased or remained constant over the previous 12 months. Favorable statistics were also released by state officials in the second half of the year concerning local employment and wage growth. Frederick County was one of only nine Maryland counties that experienced a positive job growth from 2006-2010, adding nearly 500 new jobs. The County had the 6th highest number of new jobs created during the same time frame. Also of positive note, Frederick County had the 2nd highest percentage of increase in average weekly wage per worker, from 2006-2010.

Raw data, however, does not tell the entire story of Frederick County's business economy. It is one of industry diversification, employer investment and private –public sector partnerships to name a few... all striving to enhance an already great quality of life. We look forward to experiencing an even better year in 2011!

Banner Life Insurance broke ground on their new headquarters building located in Urbana.

OED hosted their Commercial Realtors Bus Tour for metro area commercial real estate agents to showcase Frederick County properties. The day concluded with a Taste of Frederick sampling of the County's finest food offerings.

OED and partner agencies attended the International 2010 BIO Convention in Chicago, the largest bioscience trade show in the world, where they promoted Frederick County as the place to do business.

Frederick County's Top 5 Family Friendly Businesses-Best Places to Work were honored by OED and other local partners: Fort Detrick U.S. Army Garrison, Aircraft Owners & Pilots Association (AOPA), Data Management Services (DMS), SAIC-Frederick, and Frederick Memorial Healthcare Systems.

SEPT Celebrating the program's 10th year, OED visited more than 200 companies all month long as part of Business Appreciation Month to thank businesses for their contributions to our County.

The International Economic Development Council awarded OED and the Frederick County Chamber of Commerce Honorable Mention for their Frederick County Business Roundtable for Education in the category of New Media.

OCT Downtown Frederick was named one of America's Great Neighborhoods by the American Planning Association.

Frederick County Public Schools graduation rates ranked 2nd highest in Maryland (94.6%) and the drop out rate ranked 2nd lowest in Maryland (1.18%).

A groundbreaking was held for Frederick's first air traffic control tower at Frederick Municipal Airport. The expansion is expected to improve corporate jet traffic and to play a larger role in homeland security.



OED coordinated Family Festival at the Farm, a popular selfguided farm tour at 16 Frederick County farms, allowing families to experience agriculture firsthand.

The Maryland Technology Development Corporation (TEDCO) re-funded the Joint Technology Transfer Initiative with the Frederick County Board of County Commissioners and the Office of Economic Development, committing up to \$75K each for local technology transfer projects.

OED's Annual Business Reception was held at Dutch's Daughter honoring local companies for outstanding achievements.

The Frederick County Manufacturers Roundtable and OED presented a Lunch, Learn and Tour event at Washington Laboratories for the manufacturing industry.



TARGETED INDUSTRY HIGHLIGHTS

OED visited 490 companies and assisted 302 companies in 2010. OED also responded to 4,120 inquiries and worked with 189 prospects looking to locate or expand in Frederick County. Although OED works with all businesses, the following areas are targeted industries: Agriculture, Bioscience, Advanced Technology, Manufacturing and Renewable/Sustainable industries.

Agriculture


- 2010 saw continued growth in the locally grown consumer demand. To help assist in better supply of local product, a Frederick County Farmer to Restaurant Expo was created. The inaugural event had 18 local farms and 22 local restaurants participate.
- Due to excellent December weather and increased demand for fresh cut Christmas trees, the Frederick County Christmas Tree farms had their best year in sales in history in 2010. Many of the farms saw a 20 – 30% increase in sales over 2009.
- The 2010 Equine Census was released and reflected the significant value and size of the equine industry in Frederick County. Frederick County ranked #2 in the number of equine places (1,600) in the state of Maryland. Frederick also ranked #2 in total equine inventory owned (6,000).

Bioscience

- In 2010, there were 73 bioscience companies in the County, a 52% increase since 2005.
- Fort Detrick, the County's largest employment campus with 9,200 employees, has some \$798 million in construction projects underway and \$2 billion more are planned for the next 3 years. These projects and the effects of Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) have already brought 1,025 new jobs and will bring another 1,100 through 2018. 2010 saw new jobs and technology from the completion of the National Interagency Biodefense Campus (NIBC) and the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAD) and the start of construction on the new U.S. Army Medical Research Institute of Infectious Diseases (USAMRIID).
- The Frederick Innovative Technology Center, Inc (FITCI) assists start-up companies in the technology industries. FITCI has 10 bioscience companies that include: Foxsprie, GM Biosciences Inc., Innovative BioSolutions, LLC, Kempbio, LavaAmp, Medigen Inc., Meridian BioGroup, Mordechia Global Regulatory Solutions, LLC, Prolias Technologies and Steven Lane Consulting LLC. - The State of Maryland awarded over \$969,500 in expansion and training assistance to the following biotechnology companies: Akonni Biosystems, Inc., CSC DynPort Vaccines and Life Technologies Corporation.

Advanced Technology

- 2010 ended with success with the completion of the Ft. Detrick Technology
 Transfer Program. The second round concluded with 15 awards at \$50,000
 each for a grand total of \$750,000. All 15 awards were made to Maryland
 companies. In addition of the 15 awards, 5 were awarded to local Frederick companies bringing \$250,000 in monies and jobs to Frederick County.
 Those award winners were: BridgePath Scientific, Cynergene, Imagilin
 Technologies, BioAssay Works and FoxSpire.
- Tech Frederick, a local networking group for Frederick County, was established in 2010 by partners OED, City DED, and FITCI to provide networking and partnering opportunities for local tech companies. The quarterly networking events have been successful with an average of 35-40 attendees.






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

Source: Maryland Dept. Assessments and Taxation At the end of 2010, the Frederick Innovative Technology Center Inc (FITCI) was at full capacity with 16 on-site clients and 16 virtual clients. FITCI clients have generated over 200 direct new jobs in Frederick year-to-date since its opening. FITCI clients and graduates have acquired over \$27.8 million in grants and procurements. The total number of FITCI graduates has risen to 13 and FITCI clients have participated in over 18 technology transfer initiatives thus far. WGS and ThoughtQuest were 2010 FITCI graduates.

Manufacturing

- As of June 2010, there were a total of 170 manufacturing establishments employing 4,777 people and paying an average of approximately \$67 million in annual wages in Frederick County. Manufacturing represents approximately 5.1% of the total employment.
 - The average weekly wage per worker in this sector was \$1,079 (or \$56,108 annually), representing a 23% increase over the past five years.
 - Frederick County manufacturing jobs pay 31% more than the average annual wage per worker in the private sector.
 - Frederick County manufacturing jobs pay the 3rd highest weekly wage rate per worker in the private sector. (Professional and Business Services #1, Information #2 with Financial Activities #4).
- Local manufacturer Wright Manufacturing received the prestigious Maryland World Class Consortia's (MWCC) Member Company of the Year award. The MWCC aims to strengthen and grow state and national economies through performance excellence.
- OED continues to work with the Frederick County Manufacturers Roundtable, Maryland World Class Consortium, Maryland Technology Extension Services, Maryland Office of International Trade, Regional Manufacturing Institute, World Trade Center Institute and our local and state partnering agencies to improve the competitiveness of the manufacturing industry in Frederick County.

Renewable/Sustainable Industries

- Frederick County is home to more than 20 "green" companies including: U.S. Department of Agriculture, Potomac Wind Energy, UR Solar, E-END USA and MOM's Organic Market.
- OED works with partners within Frederick County Government including the Frederick County Office of Sustainability, Frederick County Commercial Recycling Programs and Frederick County Workforce Services to further develop green initiatives. In addition, OED promotes the State of Maryland's Green programs to local businesses.
 - In 2010, the Frederick County Office of Sustainability (OES) obtained \$659,800 from the U.S. Department of Energy's Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) program to implement energy and green building programs. Since 2009, the OES has secured more than \$1.2 million in grant funds for the County's sustainability initiatives.
 - OED, OES and the Frederick County Commercial Recycling Program sponsored the Waste Reduction Awards to recognize achievement by employees and local businesses. In 2010, Wells Fargo Home Mortgage and GoodWill Industries of Monocacy Valley won the awards.

Small Business Development

- SBDC continued to help new businesses start and existing businesses survive and grow, even in this challenging
 economy. SBDC helped an average of at least one business per month get started while working with many
 more existing businesses to meet and overcome the challenges they've faced. SBDC helped create over 10 new
 jobs in 2010 and existing business preserve many others.
- SBDC remained active as the hub for Frederick County's small business support community. This included
 coordinating the Entrepreneur Support Network, a collaboration of more than 20 local small business support
 organizations. SBDC helped spearhead an 'Experts & Answers' event, providing 'speed counseling' to over 20
 small businesses.
- In 2010, SBDC helped Frederick clients obtain nearly \$3 million in capital for their new and expanding companies.





As of 4th Quarter 2010, Frederick County's commercial real estate market including office, flex and industrial properties contained 1,058 buildings totaling over 25.5 million square feet.



Vacancy

The overall vacancy rate for Frederick County for year end 2010 was up slightly to 15.7% compared to 15.3% in 2009. The office and flex vacancy rate increased slightly from 2009 to 2010 while the industrial market vacancy rate decreased from 14.3% to 13.8% in 2010.

Rental Rates

Frederick County's average 2010 asking rental rate for office space was \$23.43/full service and for the non-office market it was \$6.77/triple net. Over the past five years, both the flex and industrial rental rates have been decreasing while the office market for the most part has increased. For office, average asking rates are based on per square foot, full service and for flex and industrial space, the rates are based on per square foot/triple net.

Leasing Activity

The leasing volume for 2010 totaled just over 629,000 square feet with 34% of the total leasing taking place in 4th quarter 2010. The leasing activity refers to direct sales, subleases and renewals of existing leases. It also includes any pre-leasing activity in under construction, planned buildings or under renovation buildings.

The top ten tenant renewals and move-ins for 2010 include: GSA-Department of Veterans Affairs (Frederick Corporate Park); Battelle (Thomas Johnson Drive); Frederick Community College (200 Monroe Center); Stulz Air Technology Systems (Industrial Center East); Engage Printing (Highland Center); Morgan-Keller (Thomas Johnson Drive); Beckley's Camping Center (Angleberger Rd); US Silica Company (Riverside Five); Door Supply of NJ (Kings Ct) and US Department of Agriculture (Thomas Johnson Drive).

Development

Work continued on the 330,000 square foot build-to-suit for NCI/SAIC-Frederick at Riverside Research Park and for the 115,000 square foot build-to-suit for Banner Life Insurance Company located at the Urbana Corporate Park. In 2010, one building (office) totaling 34,788 square feet was delivered in Frederick County. Looking at the region, the Suburban Maryland (Frederick-Montgomery-Prince George's) market had 7 buildings delivered totaling 257,028 square feet in 2010.

Over 2.9 million square feet has been delivered in Frederick County since 2006. Office buildings represented 42% of the total number of buildings delivered over the past five years while flex buildings represented 25% and industrial buildings represented 33% of the total.

Business Appreciation Month—10th Anniversary

In September 2010, OED conducted its 10th Annual Business Appreciation Week program. Approximately 75 Ambassadors from the State, County, Municipalities, Business Development Advisory Council and Chamber of Commerce met with 200 local companies to learn more about the businesses and to personally thank them for their contributions to the Frederick County economy. 27 companies said they had plans for future expansions.




Frederick County Business Survey

OED sought to compile feedback from businesses' on their wants, needs and perceptions with a method that was measurable from year-to-year. The goal was to produce a document that could serve as a stepping stone for future improvements, ways to increase economic development opportunities for businesses and to allow businesses a way to voice their opinions with a collective voice. The campaign took place during June and July of 2010 and 204 responses were received from the first Annual Frederick County Business Survey.

Summary of Frederick County Business Survey Results:

- 70% of companies rate Frederick County as a 7 or higher on a scale of 1-10 of doing business in Frederick County (with 10 being most favorable)
- 87% said Frederick County's overall quality of life is a strength
- 66% of companies said their sales have increased or remained constant over the last 12 months.
- 78% of companies said their number of employees have increased or remained constant over the last 12 months.
- The highest response received when asked what Frederick County's specific WEAKNESSES were: 63% for level of taxation affecting business (relative to other regions)
- The highest response received when asked what Frederick County's specific STRENGTHS were: 64% said overall quality of colleges and universities
- Industries that represented the most number of sale INCREASES over the past 12 months were: Information Technology, Aerospace, and Bioscience
- Industries that represented the most DECREASES in sales over the past 12 months were: Construction, Development and Real Estate, Education, and Hospitality and Tourism
