

Harrison-Boone County, Arkansas 'Taking Care of Business'

Harrison is the County Seat of Boone County, Arkansas, nestled in the Ozark Mountains in North Central Arkansas, only 72 miles from Northwest Arkansas (Springdale, Fayetteville, Rogers, Bentonville), 77 miles from Springfield, MO, and 139 miles from Little Rock. Harrison has enjoyed the restoration of historic landmarks, the construction of new facilities, schools, churches, and numerous commercial and industrial investments the past twenty-five years. Harrison and Boone County's investment in the future represents a long-term belief in their future. The 2018/2019 estimated census showed Harrison with a population of 13,087 and Boone County with a population of 37,480.

The Harrison community offers a healthy blend of longtime residents as well as newcomers from various parts of the country. The citizens of Harrison and Boone County enjoy an outstanding quality of life, a thriving industrial and manufacturing base and a broad-based retail shopping selection. Harrison and Boone County schools, along with the national award-winning North Arkansas College, are rich in their curriculum and have access to cutting edge technology.

The Harrison Regional Chamber of Commerce serves Harrison and surrounding areas in Boone County. From business and economic development to education, the Harrison Regional Chamber of Commerce is committed to serving not only the businesses, but also the citizens of the region. Business After Hours, information workshops, ribbon cuttings, adult and youth leadership programs, and the Chamber's annual meeting and awards program are among networking opportunities provided to Chamber investors regularly.

Harrison is a thriving small city, marrying a historic manufacturing tradition – with 8 global manufactures among its 14, and 7 of those 8 have their global headquarters locally – and a strong education heritage into an attractive location for growing a business, a community, a lifestyle.

Industry came to Harrison with the railroads in the late 19th century, and it remains one of the strongest business centers in Arkansas today, with more than 5,000 of its workforce employed in one of the city's 30-plus prime business operations. Those operations produce and deliver diversified products and services, everything from automobile engine parts to commercial trailer flooring to folding cartons to plastic injection molding to communications, food service, banking, healthcare and education, all thriving on the strong North Central Arkansas work ethic.
